



Overview

- Have we made progress against global targets?
 - <20,000 new child infections in 2020 In 2019: 150,000
 - 1.4 million children <15 years receiving treatment in 2020 In 2019: 950,000
- ... and what has happened in 2020? ... COVID-19 service disruptions
 - Initial drops in pregnant women receiving ART appear to have been temporary
 - Declines in children receiving treatment in 2020



Progress toward global target of 95% coverage is good, but new HIV infections among children persist












We know there are three key interventions to reduce new child infections




- Close the remaining gaps in access to <u>ART for pregnant</u> women – primarily in western and central Africa
- Support women to <u>remain in</u> <u>care and adhering</u> to treatment throughout pregnancy and breastfeeding
- Prevent <u>new HIV infections</u> among pregnant and breastfeeding women

The impact of COVID-19 on PMTCT services

- Assuming services were at normal volume in February
- There was a dip in services in some countries but all countries have returned to parity with February's numbers



Botswana used March as baseline instead of February Source: Preliminary analysis of UNAIDS, UNICEF and WHO HIV services disruption monitoring data, September 2020






Early infant diagnosis has improved since 2015 but remains alarmingly low

- Globally 720,000 HIV exposed children were tested at 2 months,
- Well short of the 1.3 million children exposed to HIV during pregnancy and delivery in 2019

Percent of HIV exposed children receiving a virological test at 2 months of age, focus countries, 2015 and 2019








Impact of COVID-19 on early infant diagnosis

- Assuming services were at normal volume in February
- There was a dip in services in 5 of 8 countries reporting data



53% of children living with HIV are receiving treatment compared to 68% of adults



- Only 950,000 children receiving treatment in 2019
- Children living with HIV is declining as children age into adulthood
- Most recent data suggest lower numbers in mid-2020



Children living with HIV not on treatment is declining These children are older and will not be identified through early infant diagnosis

Children living with HIV **not** receiving antiretroviral therapy by age group, focus countries, 2019



- Children living with HIV are aging out
- Reduction in vertical transmissions means that 69% of the untreated children are over age five




Gaps to the 90-90-90 targets are wider for children

Compared to adults:

Children are less likely to be diagnosed

And among those on ART, children are less likely to have suppressed viral loads







What do we know about adolescents?

- 12 of the 21 focus countries provided age disaggregated data
- Among those 12, 5 did not have data for the 15-19 age group
- 2 countries show lower coverage for people 10-19 years
- Continued effort to disaggregate data and review gaps in treatment by age

Children and adolescents living with HIV receiving antiretroviral therapy by age group, select countries, 2019









Conclusions

- Maintain the gains on closing treatment gap for pregnant women
- Provide options for women at risk of HIV to test routinely during their reproductive years
- Support women living with HIV to remain virally suppressed during pregnancy and breastfeeding
- Reach the remaining 600,000 HIV exposed infants with early infant diagnosis
- Intensify family index testing to reach the remaining 850,000 children currently not on treatment
