

# Welcome



Dear Colleagues,

COVID-19 has taxed everything – our medical problem solving, our ability to process a bewildering amount of information, our resilience in the face of so much death and suffering - with an epidemic that has moved at unprecedented speed and infecting such an overwhelming number of people.

For those of us in the low-and-middle income countries it was unsurprising to see rich (and sometimes even poorer) countries cynically hoarding resources, confiscating drugs destined for less resourced regions at airports, and implementing clearly racist restrictions on movements. The painful current situation, where booster vaccines are administered in rich countries at six times the rate as primary vaccinations in poor regions, is an ongoing international scandal.

The virus has brutally unveiled the fault lines within our societies, between and within countries – between rich and poor, and between every tier of discrimination – and allowed the exploitation of vulnerable and scared populations by corrupt, evil politicians, business people and influencers, on an unprecedented scale.

But there is a major upside. The HIV and international research, clinician, and activist community, as well as many donors, came together immediately – calling for solidarity, using their existing information networks to share information, resources and ideas, generously and quickly giving advice. We all recognised the global disaster this was – and that we valued each other's humanity enough to step up and try to help. I had world experts in virology, epidemiology, drug development and statistics, speaking directly to scared local community nurses and angry treatment activists. The fury from my colleagues in the richest corners of the globe at their governments and policy makers, and their efforts to support the poorest parts of the world in access to better medical care, made me proud to be part of this broad medical community. The support, understanding and often desperately needed humour between low-income country clinicians as we tried to juggle issues around oxygen and heart-breaking triage and politician idiocy kept many of us sane.

These workshops are part of this – this one focused exclusively on LMICs - have kept us all in touch, kept us on top of our game, and meant we do the best with what we have. We have a stellar group of speakers, assembled by a wonderful hard-working committee and the always-professional Virology Education. I hope you enjoy the talks.
