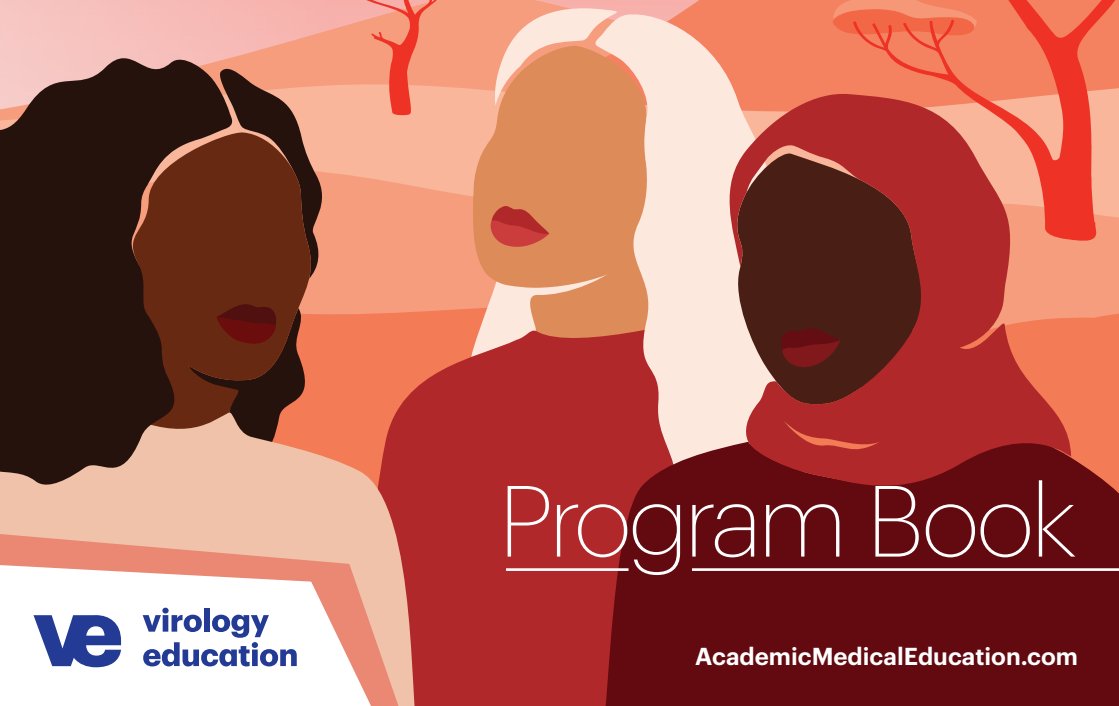

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We are delighted that you have joined us for this inaugural African Workshop on HIV and Women. We hope this program brings fruitful face-to-face and online interactions that foster new research ideas, builds friendships, and enhances collaboration. The workshop showcases state-of-the-art science, provides food for thought, and an opportunity for discussing all aspects of women's health in the context of HIV. We hope that this meeting will invigorate all of us in our shared mission of preventing new HIV infections and improving the health and quality of life of women living with HIV in Africa.

Women are disproportionately affected by the HIV epidemic worldwide and account for 63% of people living with HIV in sub-Saharan Africa. Adolescent girls and young women need particular focus as they remain vulnerable, experiencing 4600 new HIV infections per week, and accounted for 25% of new HIV infections globally in 2020. This is driven by gender inequality and discrimination which disempowers girls and women,

denying them decision-making power, sexual autonomy, and educational opportunities. Only a third of young women have accurate and comprehensive knowledge about HIV and globally, almost 30% of women have experienced gender-based violence. The challenge remains what we as healthcare workers, researchers, industry, policy makers, or people with lived experience can do to change this.

This workshop provides a unique platform for individuals from multiple sectors - including healthcare, academia, government, and the community - to come together to listen, discuss, debate, and set direction on HIV prevention and treatment, as well as sexual and reproductive health. The program spans all stages of the female life course from adolescence, pregnancy and breastfeeding to menopause and healthy aging. The perspectives of those with lived experience, early-career researchers, and experts from all regions of the African continent have been given priority, while skill-building workshops





will serve as an intimate forum to develop expertise in abstract writing, grants penmanship, engaging in research and advocacy, and innovation in the digital space.

It's wonderful to convene here in Nairobi, Kenya with key representatives from the Ministry of Health and key stakeholders. Kenya is renowned for its beautiful landscapes, warm people, and for being the cradle of humankind. Kenya has an impressive track record of HIV prevention and treatment research over several decades, as well as delivery of community programs supporting women and advocacy by people with lived experience. So, there's no better place to kick off this workshop. Karibu sana!

On behalf of the organising committee, we look forward to a vibrant, informative, and enjoyable meeting and encourage both the audience attending in person and on-line to actively engage with each other and the speakers. Let's hope that this is the first of many successful African workshops on HIV and Women.
